International Course Migration

The course aims to

- promote the understanding of central aspects concerning young people in migration contexts.
- help students draw conclusions for projects, approaches and ethical positions in social work with migrant and refugee minors.
- enable the exchange of ideas among students of different European universities and the development of an awareness of different traditions in social work and different discourses on migration.

The target groups are

students doing their Bachelor's degree in social work at one of the Swiss Universities of Applied Sciences and students of their international partner universities. All lectures and workshops will be held in English, an intermediate level is therefore required.

The international course focuses on

migration and youth particularly with regard to inclusion, transnationalism and human rights. The migration of people to and within European countries has been accompanied by processes of drawing territorial, social and symbolic borders and boundaries and co-existing policies of welcoming and solidarity. The recent increase in the number of minors arriving in Europe as refugees has intensified existing discussions in politics, civil society and social work.

What can we learn from long-standing processes of inclusion and exclusion and the experiences of young immigrants who have already settled and the so called second generation? How do different persons involved, including young immigrants and refugees, negotiate boundaries both on a national and a transnational level? What strategies do they develop to overcome difficulties? Which policies are conducive to their inclusion? Particular questions arise regarding the wellbeing of vulnerable groups such as children, young people and, especially, unaccompanied refugee minors. How can social work support and empower these groups and promote their social participation? How can human rights be upheld? How are social workers emotionally involved and in what way do they contribute to reproducing or overcoming boundaries? The lectures and workshops address these questions relating to transnational mobility. family, gender, education, labour market, political participation, media and health.
